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In any classroom in any country, the instructor teaches more than just art or history or language. Part of what is going on consciously or not is the teaching of culture: the attitudes, values and beliefs in the society.

1. Every education system is inevitably a mirror that reflects the culture of the society it is a part of.
2. In many western countries, such as the United States or Canada, which are made up of many different nations,
3. religious groups and cultural orientations, individualism and dependent thinking are highly valued.
4. And these values are reflected by education systems in these countries. Teachers emphasize the qualities that let each student special. Students are seldom
5. expected to memorize information. However,
6. they are encouraged to think for themselves, find answers on their own and come up with individual solutions. At an early age, students learn to form their own ideas and opinions, and to express their ideas when class discussion.
7. In Japan, in contrast, the vast majority of people share
8. the same language, history, and culture. Perhaps for this reason, the education system here reflects a belief in
9. group goals and traditions than individualism.

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
